PASTOR'S PAGE

Carole King has written some beautiful songs in her day, including one called "Bitter and Sweet" (1972). I'm really dating myself now! I recently heard it on Spotify, and it caught my attention. The song boils down to: You have to take the bitter with the sweet in life. It got me pondering how life *is both*, bitter and sweet. As we enter into Holy Week, in just another week from today, we are all aware of the one year anniversary of the COVID-19 global pandemic. The pandemic has certainly been a bitter time for all of us. Tucked away in the bitter, have been some occasional "sweet" things, too. These have been a big encouragement as we navigate this bloody pandemic. One of those has been the remarkable people "on the front lines" of this medical professionals, postal workers, grocers, teachers, and others. Another, closer to home for me, has been the way we, as a church, have been able to adapt to the many restrictions of this pandemic. We have learned how to conduct meetings, and even our Annual Meeting with Zoom. Some have been able to spend more time with family.

I think all of us would prefer the way things were *before* this pandemic. It is almost like we are the Israelites wandering through the wilderness, living on manna and quail. We miss singing together. We've had to search for the "silver linings" in this time of upheaval, loss, and grief. Maybe you have other thoughts about what may have been, at least, a reprieve from the pandemic. One thing I've done a lot more of has been walking and exercising outside. This has been a blessing. "The little things" seem a lot bigger now: Like a handshake, a hug, a lunch shared inside without masks, singing in worship with abandon, going to the concert, and the importance of our friends and family. Daily prayers have become much more significant, including intercessions for many. And, further, many of us realize anew the deep significance of God's steadfast love (Psalm 118), and of *faith, hope and love* (I Corinthians 13).

I don't want to minimize the impact of the pandemic. Yet, anyone in medicine knows that it is nothing short of miraculous the speed with which vaccines have been developed. I am a vaccine proponent, and I'm thankful to have received my first shot, by sheer luck (and/or God's grace). Thankfully, vaccines are coming on strong now, and we can maybe see the light at the end of the tunnel.

Holy Week also contains the "bitter and the sweet." Jesus went through the bitter woe of his own passion: his Last Supper with his beloved disciples, the garden, the betrayal, the arrest, mockery and scorn, and finally, nails and the horror of the cross. We also know that is not the end of the story. There is also a "fairy tale ending" – that is no fairy tale. It is the hope of the ages. May God's power to resurrect and renew us be at work as we move into Easter hope, and the joy of spring and thereafter summer. Finally, a quote on "little things" or small things:

But we live in a world that has lost its appreciation for small things. We live in a world that wants things bigger and bigger. We want to supersize our fries, sodas, and church buildings. But amid all the supersizing, many of us feel God doing something new, something small and subtle. This thing Jesus called the kingdom of God is emerging across the globe in the most unexpected places, a gentle whisper amid the chaos. Little people with big dreams are reimagining the world. Little movements of communities of ordinary radicals are committed to doing small things with great love. —Shane Claiborne, <u>The Irresistible Revolution</u>, Grand Rapids: Zondervan, 2006 p 25.

STEVENS COUNTY FOOD SHELF

Please consider a generous gift to the ongoing food from now thru April 11th. Donations can be made directly to the Stevens County Food Shelf. Visit their website at: <u>https://stevenscountyfoodshelf.org/</u> for more information.

The Stevens County Food Shelf is happy to announce free rides and delivery options for people who do not have transportation to the food shelf. Residents of Morris may call the Morris Transit to schedule a ride with 2 hours advance notice. Please make sure that you only schedule rides for a time when the food shelf is open (see regular hours, below).

When you call to schedule a ride, tell them you are riding directly to the Food Shelf, and the ride will be free of charge. Rides should be scheduled two hours in advance, if possible, and must go directly to the food shelf without other stops in order to qualify for the free ride.

When arriving, visitors will stay on the bus and volunteers will bring out a short form to allow visitors to select the items they would like. Volunteers will pack requested items and bring them out, then the Transit will return visitors to their home.

Stevens County residents outside of Morris may contact the Rainbow Rider for food delivery during our regular hours every day except Thursday, as our hours fall outside of Rainbow Rider operating hours on that day.

To receive a free delivery of food outside of Morris, call or email the Food Shelf to place a food request, and then call the Rainbow Rider to schedule your delivery day and time. Please place your food request at least one day in advance so that our volunteers have time to pack these items. The Rainbow Rider will deliver these items to your home.


There is no special paperwork required to visit the Stevens County Food Shelf. All are welcome.
