### SUNDAY SCHOOL CHRISTMAS PROGRAM

"A Carol for You, A Carol for Me"

Reading: This year we wanted to do a little something different! We invite you to a program full of caroling, joyful noise, song, and just a little education. We hope you enjoy and Merry Christmas! Here is a little information about our 1st song. The lyrics to this simple song, "O Come Little Children" is a German Christmas carol created in 1798 by a Catholic priest, Christoph von Schmid. Many of his poems and books were written in direct and simple language, as he hoped to teach children of faith and belief.

"O, Come Little Children" (children sing)

Reading: "Away in a Manger" is a Christmas carol first published in the late nineteenth century and sung all around the English speaking world. In Britain, it is one of the most popular carols. The popularity of the carol has led to many variants in the words

"Away in a Manger" (bells; children sing vs 1; all sing vs 2)

Reading: "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" is a hymn based on Luke 2:8-14, the part of the Christmas story that includes the angels and shepherds. The hymn has a rich tradition and is considered by some to be more than just a Christmas hymn. Did you know "hark" means to listen or pay attention?

"Hark the Herald Angels Sing" (children sing vs 1-2; all sing vs 3

Reading: "Deck the Halls" is a traditional Christmas carol. The melody is Welsh, dating back to the sixteenth century, and belongs to a winter carol. The English lyrics were written by a Scottish musician in 1862.

"Deck the Halls" (children sing vs 1-2; all sing vs 3)

Reading: "O Tannenbaum" which in German means O, Fir Tree is known in English as "O Christmas Tree". This is a German Christmas song based on a traditional folk song that was unrelated to the holiday, but it became associated with the traditional Christmas tree. The lyrics refer to refer to the fir's evergreen quality as a symbol of constancy and faithfulness.

"O Christmas Tree" (all sing vs 1-3)

Reading: "Silent Night" was written by Austrian priest Joseph Mohr in 1816 and set to music by Franz Gruber, the organist at a church in Austria in 1818. The song became popular after being performed by the Strasser family, a group of traveling glovemakers. The Strassers sang the song in costumes at markets in Germany, including the Christmas market in 1831.

"Silent Night" (children sing vs 1-2; all sing vs 3)

Reading: "Joy to the World" is an English Christmas carol. It was written in 1719 by the English minister and hymnist Isaac Watts. Since the 20th century, Joy to the World has been the most-published Christmas hymn in North America. As of December 2009, it was published in 1,387 hymnals in North America.

"Joy to the World" (bells; children sing vs 1, all sing vs 2-4)

Reading: Thank you for singing along with us today! We had the best time. Merry Christmas to all! We hope you enjoy the spirit of the season, time with family and friends, and the celebration of the birth of Jesus. Everyone is invited to join us for a hot chocolate bar following the service in the fellowship hall.
